





10 New Kids' Books About Pride

Amidst attempts around the country to ban LGBTOinclusive children's books, the sheer number of new titles being published gives me hope. Here are some of my favorite new ones about Pride and the early LGBTQ rights movement, perfect for this month but worth reading all year round.

For the Very Youngest



"We Are the Rainbow! The Colors of Pride," by Claire and il-Winslow lustrated by Riley Samels (Sunbird Books): This board book takes readers on a journey through


the colors of the LGBTQ rainbow flag and the meanings behind those colors. While there are already several similar books, this one is notable for its visible inclusion of gender creative and trans people, as well as a wide range of children and adults across many aspects of identity.



"ABC Pride," by Louie Stowell and Elly Barnes, illustrated by Amy Phelps (DK Children): A bright and cheery alphabet book that not only features words and definitions spe-

eific to queer culture and identities, but also ones related to emotions like "acceptance," "belonging," "kindness," and "love," Explanations are simple enough for the age group but also consider many aspects of LGBTQ identi-

Other Picture Books



Twas the Night Before Pride," McClint-Joanna ick and illustrated by Juana Medina (Candlewick): This fun take on the classic poem shows a child getting ready for the Pride parade

and happily retelling the history of Pride to their younger sibling. It captures the meaning and history of the event with just the right amount of detail for younger ages, while blending it with a relatable family story. One of the moms is also "that kind of mom who's more boyish than girly"-a bit of representation that we don't always get to see. Also available in Spanish as "La vispera de Orgullo."



"The Rainbow Parade," by Emily Neilson (Dial): A young girl with two moms is excited about going to the Pride Parade in this winsome

story based on the author-illustrator's own experience as a child. When a drag queen suggests to the watching Emily that she and her moms should be in the parade, Emily isn't sure ... until a group marches by with an "LGBTQ+ Families" banner. Emily and her moms then join in the fun. At the end, she tells her moms she's going to practice pride "all year long,"




Meaning of Pride," by Rosiee Thor and illustrated by Sam Kirk (Versify): This colorful inclusive inand troduction to the people and achievements that give Pride

its meaning covers both the history of Pride and the qualities it encompasses, like wearing what you want and feeling good, fighting for your rights and those of others, and more. Each spread shows famous LGBTQIA+ people who represent the relevant concept.



"The Big Book of Pride Flags," by Jessica Kingsley Publishers, illustrated by Jem Milton: Pride flags across the LG-BTQIA+ spectrum fill this colorful book. Each page offers a bit of history


about the flag as well as an explanation of the identity(ies) behind it and what the colors mean.



Harvey Milk Story," by Kari Krakow, illustrated by David C. Gardner (Lee & Low): Long out of print but now reissued, this biography looks at Milk's life from birth through his assassination, and conveys his significance with


warmth and appreciation. The text is wordy enough that it's best for the older end of the picture book age range, but that will be a selling point for such readers looking for a substantial biography.

Middle Grade Books




"History Comics: The Stonewall Riots: Making a Stand for LGBTQ Rights," by Archie Bongiovanni and illustrated by A. Andrews (First Second): In this fun yet informative graphic novel, modern three

queer teens are magically transported back to the Stonewall Inn in June 1969, where they meet Marsha P. Johnson, Silvia Rivera, and Stormé DeLaverie, learn more about queer history, and are motivated to take action on current challenges once they are back in the present. The story is obviously fictionalized, but is in many ways one of the best short LGBTQ histories for this age group.



"Pride: An Inspirational History of the LGBTQ+ Movement," by Stella Caldwell (Penguin Workshop): A broad overview of LGBTQ rights from ancient times to the present, this book emphasizes the U.K. and U.S. occasionally but ventures farther afield. It covers pol-

itics, culture, media, social movements, and more, and is interspersed with snapshot biographies of a variety of LGBTQ people throughout history as well as profiles of young LGBTQ people today.



"Small Pride," by Phil (Harp-Stamper erCollins): this fictional title, 13-year-old Jake has just come out as gav in his small Ohio town, lake's father, in a perhaps overly enthusiastic show of support, raises a giant rainbow flag in their yard. This triggers panic among some

members of the community, including the conservative mayor, who are afraid the flag might signal the start of an actual Pride celebration. Jake gets caught up in small-town politics as he and his friends work to make that vision a reality. At a time when some of the most vicious real-life battles for LGBTQ inclusion are taking place in town councils and school boards, Stamper not only reflects the state of our country but also shows us one possible, hopeful way forward. That's no small feat.



Through death and sedition, Pride endures

No crown for a tyrant but gold glitter

I write this on the eye of the sixth anniversary of the Pulse nightclub massacre. It is early morning. Cars are being towed below my window to make way for the Capital Pride parade. On an earlier anniversary, members of the Gay Men's Chorus of Washington stood beside the Dupont Circle fountain and sang in memory of the Pulse victims.

As I contemplate the state of America this Pride season, it is less than thirty-six hours since Rep. Liz Cheney's devastating summary of the case against Donald Trump and his co-conspirators in the attempted overthrow of our government. The violent images from the House January 6 Committee's video of the insurrection at the Capitol fill my mind. Capitol Police officer Caroline Edwards, who was wounded by rioters, testified, "I was slipping in people's blood."

Death is never distant. The Gay Men's Chorus family (I was a cofounder in 1981) is grieving the loss of our longtime vocal coach, a witty and kind man who has died at 81. Another chorus founder turns 81 in two weeks. Those who survived AIDS long enough to die of other causes have borne the burden of endurance and memory. Much teaching is done out of school.

Individuals pass away, but our community lives on to face new struggles. In this time of threat to democracy, unscrupulous politicians like Florida governor Ron DeSantis throw kindling on the culture wars, including demonizing LGBTQ people. A video of Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene's new intern, professedly ex-gay Milo Yiannopoulos, in drag mocking Rep. Ilhan Omar only confirms that the toxic Georgia congresswoman can spot a soulmate.

Another congressional hearing on violence featured 11-year-old Miah Cerrillo, a survivor of the Uvalde school shooting, testifying via pre-recorded video that she smeared a classmate's blood on herself and played dead. Another girl at Robb Elementary called 911 using her teacher's phone after it fell when the teacher was fatally shot.

The resourcefulness of those brave girls should shame us into striving to be worthy of them. Meanwhile, Mitch McConnell used a foiled attack on Justice Brett Kavanaugh to demand that the House pass increased security for Supreme Court justices "before the sun sets

I am relieved to know that Justice Kavanaugh is better protected than schoolchildren. But when security measures are shown to have worked, perhaps we should redirect our attention to situations where they have not. Incidentally, I hope Mitch is equally solicitous of the safety of incoming Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson. The GOP is highly selective with its moral indignation

Republicans responded to the primetime June 9 congressional hearing by saying contradictorily that they didn't watch and it was a snooze fest and there was nothing new. Despite mountains of evidence, they mock, dismiss, deflect, and deny the truth about Trump's attempted coup.

Trump's continued insistence that the presidency was stolen from him and that he be reinstated recalls a scene in "Game of Thrones." Viserys keeps demanding his golden crown and draws his sword, a capital offense in the sacred city. Finally Khal Drogo crowns him by pouring molten gold on his head. Daenerys coldly observes that her brother, having died by fire, was no true dragon

Of course it would be barbaric to pour molten gold on Trump's head. It is something one of his dictator friends would do. As to whether he is a true dragon, let us not compare those wondrous creatures to someone of such low character.

Still, there is something medieval about the MAGA crowd. A video shown by the January 6 committee features the Proud Boys marching belligerently through our capital city chanting, "Whose streets? Our streets!" Pardon me, but the streets belong to everyone.


I admit that some of these fascist hooligans have their roughhewn appeal. Proud Boys leader Enrique Tarrio, now boasting the street cred of a seditious conspiracy charge, looks ready for his Tom of Finland photo shoot as he lurks menacingly behind dark glasses. He will be a big hit in prison.

Contrary to the counterproductive and short-sighted decision by some Pride organizations to bar police from participating in marches, a fitting response to the Trumpist thugs is to show solidarity with the good officers who defended our Capitol. We can also display our pride by putting the defense of our imperiled republic ahead of grievances over gas and grocery prices.

As a gesture to our would-be tyrant, we can throw gold glitter on an effigy of his head.

Almost Normal

Over Memorial Day weekend, I found myself sitting in the Great Room in the lodge at Easton Mountain, a retreat center for gay men in the wilds of Upstate New York. A formerly regular visitor, Easton was my second home for almost 20 years, a refuge. Now I'm back, sitting in a group of about 30 mostly middle-aged gay men for the first time since 2019. It feels both strange and natural, a taste of normal life after more than two years in a pandemic.

I started going to Easton when I was in my mid-40s, in the early '00s. Easton felt like a gay throwback to Kripalu, the ashram/yoga center where I lived in the early '90s, where I learned the basics of yoga and developed friendships that have enriched my life ever since. When Kripalu's residential community fell apart and my friends left, Easton took its place, filling a void in my life.

But even before Covid, my visits to Easton Mountain became sporadic; I was traveling, doing my one-man show at Fringe Festivals in the US and Canada. Then Covid came along, and my sense of isolation, along with my hunger for community, was reawakened-stronger than

The weekend was a celebration of Easton's 22nd birthday and the kickoff to their summer season. (They had limited programming over the past two years, but they're hosting a full schedule this summer). At the opening circle, I looked around the room and felt reasonably comfortable in the indoor space, since everyone was vaccinated, boosted, and had a recent negative test. Still, it felt a bit strange to be close to other bodies, to be part of a large group after so many months of isolation

On that first night I did the mental math, my habitual calculations regarding the poten-

tial risks of Covid exposure. I'd had the virus in April and had received my second booster, so I was in the sweet spot, that narrow window when I had a high level of protection-or so I hoped. The next evening, I did a reading from my memoir in front of a live audience in real space and time, something I've dearly missed.

And yet, by the second day of the retreat I was drained, exhausted. I wanted and needed connection, but I was out of practice, used to being on my own for days at a time. For a natural introvert like me, socializing takes practice; I felt like a runner who hadn't gone through his warm up routine.

I retreated back to my room, where I eventually got a second wind. I realized I needed to pace myself, that what was formerly normal was now novel, something rare and special.

Over the weekend, we had a pool party, a dance, and lit a bonfire in the woods. For the first time in two years, Covid wasn't the primary topic of conversation. Instead we talked about our work, our hobbies, and plans for summer vacations. I gave and received hugs without worrying about their potential consequences and my risk factors. For three days, I felt a chasm, a void of loneliness being partially

Today, back in the real world, I'm still doing the mental math, gauging my risk of going a second round with Covid. I mask up on the T, at my gym, and in other indoor spaces. But I realize that I have to live my life, and that this is the new normal, in 2022.

I need connection, and I'm willing to take some risks to get it.





The first owner of the Agency was Anne Romano, who opened the agency with her friend Shari Didinsky. Ms. Romano was the mother of the then Manager of the Boston Ramrod bar on Boylston Street. This indicates that there has been a connection between the Agency and the Gay community since day one.

In 1986 Anne sold the Agency to Erika and Neil Daykin who moved the Agency to the Penthouse at 164 Newbury Street. They remained the owners of the Agency until 1991 when Paul Moreno and Stephen Barlow took over the helm, and have been the owners since. To this date the Daykins are still involved with 5 Star Travel.

Moreno and Barlow focused their clientele to cater mostly towards the Gay Community. They joined the International Gay and Lesbian Travel Association (IGLTA) where Moreno was elected twice as a Board Member. The Agency received several Travel and small business awards in the 90's and early 2000's. Their business grew from a mere \$700,000 in annual sales, to over \$3.5 million a year, and were at one point the top selling Agency for the popular gay chartered cruises in the East Coast. Then came the internet and travel-sites.

In 2004 5 Star moved to Columbus Avenue in the South End as more space was needed for their office space. "This was the best move we ever made" Moreno said "We were on a corner location and had several more walk-ins."

In 2018 5 Star Travel joined the Tzell New England Travel Group, a conglomerate of nearly 50 Travel Agencies in New England. With their combined sales of well over \$1 Billion, the Agency Network (and all its affiliated agencies) are able to provide their clients with competitive deals such as the major travel sites, but still provide the small personal 'pop 'n pop' Agency touch.

Last year 5 Star Travel lost its Manager, Jack Campbell, after a battle with cancer, who worked for the Agency for 27 years. He was a beloved associate of the Beantown Softball League, Boston's Gay Softball Teams, arranging most of their group travels to tournaments and World Series.

Moreno and Barlow look forward to many more years as part of the 5 Star Travel family, and would like to remind everyone that "Without a Travel Agent, you are on your own".


